- Relational skills, including communication skills

Infrastructure and activities

Dynamic security requires an infrastructure that allows meaningful activities

Staff must have relational skills and the competence to lead an activity

Identifying the places and resources for these activities is a step towards raising awareness of the dynamic security continuum

Risk assessment- intelligence and information flow

The risk- and needs assessment methods and ability to use them in a manner that contributes to positive change and to detect risk. The best way to acquire knowledge about prisoners is to get to know them.
